

STUDENT LIFE

The Division of Student Life creates a campus environment for learning and development by serving student's interests in every aspect of university life. CAREER SERVICES CENTER

The **Career Services Center** provides a comprehensive career development program to assist students in developing and implementing a strategic career plan. Students are encouraged to use the center's services at any time during their academic experience for: career counseling and assessment, career resource library, job search resources, internship opportunities, job shadowing program, resume assistance, mock interviews, career-related workshops, business etiquette dinners, job fairs, and on-campus interviews with companies and school districts. To assist students with career decisions, the Center provides MyPlan.com, a robust, comprehensive web-based career planning program. All unmarried students under 21 years of age who have completed fewer than 30 semester credit hours accepted by Tarleton must reside in the residence halls and eat in the university dining facilities. Housing contracts are for an academic year (fall and spring). Students who live with a parent or parents at their legal, full-time residence within 60 miles of campus according to the official state mileage chart, or students who are married, or who have a child are excused from this policy. LEARNING COMMUNITIES

A learning community is a set of courses in which students having a common major or interest may enroll. Participation in this program allows students to be part of a group enrolled in primarily the same courses. Each community is limited to no more than 24 students. Students benefit from the linked courses through connections with peers, faculty, and a higher level of engagement in the scholarly work. The Learning Communities occur in the Fall semester only.

RESIDENTIAL COLLEGE

The Residential College program is a year-long program made up of several residential communities linked with an academic department. Based upon the student's major, a group of courses are shared with peers living in the same hall. The Residential College fosters connections with peers, faculty, staff, and a higher level of engagement in the scholarly work. Additionally, students in residential college reside with other Residential College participants and are provided reserved study space for individual, quiet study as well as group study areas within the residential community. Further, Residential College students received dedicated time from Research Librarians to assist the student in conducting research and meet with academic tutors or supplemental instructors within the residential facility.

RECREATIONAL SPORTS

Tarleton State University, Recreational Sports Department provides a variety of recreational activities and events to meet the physical fitness and/or personal enjoyment needs of Tarleton State University students, retirees, faculty/staff and spouse. Extracurricular opportunities are coordinated and implemented to provide intramural team and individual sports, self-directed activities, and special events.

The Recreation Sports Center is a 70,000 square foot facility, which houses a weight room, climbing wall, four racquetball courts, men's and women's locker rooms, outdoor pursuits equipment check-out, three basketball/volleyball courts, three badminton courts, archery range, and two classrooms. The second floor includes two group exercise rooms, track-side cardio, cardio theatre, three-lane track, and the administrative office suite.

The Vance Terrell Intramural Complex is equipped with four all-purpose fields to serve various organized and open recreational activities. Intramural Team Sports' programs played at this facility include flag football, soccer, and softball. Tarleton Challenge is an energizing ropes course learning experience. By combining high and low elements, the staff will provide clientele with a safe, fun, unique and innovative opportunity to promote group and personal growth, team-building, as well as communication and trust. RODEO ACTIVITIES

STUDENT COUNSELING CENTER

The Student Counseling Center provides counseling services to students enrolled on the Stephenville campus at Tarleton. Services include individual, couples, pre-marital, family counseling, and group counseling. Assertiveness, body image, grief and loss counseling are also provided. We also provide preventative educational outreach programs to student groups, residence halls, fraternities and sororities on various topics such as stress management, test anxiety, relationship issues, eating disorders and alcohol use. STUDENT HEALTH CENTER

The Student Health Center provides health care services to all enrolled Tarleton State University students. Appointments are required, except in the case of an emergency. The Health Service Fee covers basic office visits.

Services provided include selected immunizations, medications and other supplies for treatment of minor/acute illnesses and injuries, suturing of simple lacerations, services of a medical doctor, nurse practitioner, or physician's assistant at specified times, administration of allergy injections as directed by the student's allergist, consultations regarding any health problems, blood pressure checks and loan of crutches. Physical exams and women's health exams are also available on a fee basis. There are minimal charges for various methods of birth control, pharmacy, laboratory tests and treatments. Follow-up health care after surgery or any illness, as directed by the student's physician, is offered as is assistance with referral to physician or hospital when deemed necessary. We are a Tarleton ally and advocate for the physically disabled. The university offers students a comprehensive injury and sickness insurance plan to cover students beyond the services of the Student Health Center.
