



As you might have heard, Tarleton State University is positioned for an unprecedented increase in our incoming Fall 2010 class.

Residential Living & Learning has been discussing an expanded occupancy plan to accommodate this influx of students in an environment that will ensure the least amount of disruption possible. Cozy, temporary living arrangements, although not ideal, are desirable because incoming students have the opportunity to

- reside on campus and live with their peers
- access the academic buildings and Tarleton resources necessary to student success

On campus housing will provide temporary living arrangements using the following methods with the goal to place students in a traditional, permanent housing assignment as quickly as space becomes available.

- Traditions Hall will offer temporary triple accommodation. Each student in a triple will be provided a bed, desk and chair, and drawers. As space becomes available, students in triples will be expected to de-triple into a traditional assignment on campus.
- Bender Hall and Ferguson Hall will offer temporary double accommodation. Each student in a double will be provided a bed, desk and chair, and drawers. As space becomes available, students in doubles will be expected to move into a traditional assignment on campus.
- Residential Leader rooms will offer temporary double accommodation. Each student in a double will be provided a bed, desk and chair, and drawers. As space becomes available, students living with a Residential Leader will be expected to move into a traditional assignment on campus.

To minimize confusion associated with billing, each student in the rooms where a student is temporarily assigned will be charged the full rate associated with the assigned hall with the expectation to receive a reduced rate while living within the temporary living arrangement. A refund for the reduced rate will be issued when the temporarily assigned student moves into a traditional assignment on campus.
