

President's Excellence in Research Scholars (PERS) Research Symposium

Our inaugural President's Excellence in Research Scholars (PERS) Research Symposium was a resounding success! 100 research posters were presented and over 300 people participated in the event where PERS recipients and other faculty and students presented poster and oral presentations. The President's Excellence in Research Scholars (PERS) opportunity awarded approximately \$817,000 in funding for 51 student-led research projects that took place from June through August, 2021.

Faculty Spotlight: Shining a Light on Research Interests of Our Faculty



Name: Dr. Jennifer Edwards

College/Department: College of Liberal and Fine Arts/Communication Studies

What is your role at Tarleton State University and how long have you worked here? Professor of Communication, Associate Provost for Faculty Initiatives, and Executive Director of the Texas Social Media Research and the Rural Communication Institutes, 15 years.

What is your research interest and how did it come about? Health Communication and Rural Areas - I am a 5th generation North East Texan with many family members who struggle to navigate and access rural health care and access to basic needs resources. I've dedicated my life to bridging the gap between people in rural areas and their access to state/federal resources and information.

Did you receive any research-related advice from a mentor that really resonated with you? What was that advice? Yes, my mentor and first department head, Dr. Charles Howard, always reminded me to select a research topic for which I had a passion. He encouraged me to focus on a topic that can impact the community, involve students, and change lives. Also, he encouraged me to publicize my research to others outside of Tarleton. He always stated, "If others do not know about your research, did it really happen? Did it make an impact?"

What research are you currently engaged in? Currently, I am involved in several research projects focused on health communication during the pandemic. This year, over 40 graduate students and I conducted research focused on how state and federal agencies communicated with the public about the COVID-19 pandemic and safety guidelines. Also, Dr. Subi Gandhi and I are researching vaccine and proactive health hesitancy in rural areas.

Describe an externally funded project that you have led or participated in, if any, and what you learned or discovered from that experience. Over the past year, I've been fortunate to serve as lead and co-lead for seven externally funded projects at Tarleton State. One of my most memorable experiences was funded by the Hogg Foundation and it focused on the promotion of the U.S. Census



in rural areas. Through our partnership with local Census representatives, we promoted the Census on the side of highways, at the front of grocery stores, and in city parks. As a result of this outreach, we discovered additional barriers experienced by individuals in rural areas (food insecurity, job insecurity, transportation issues, access to healthcare). This one project served as the foundation for the rest of the Rural Communication Institute's our current projects focused on health outreach and vaccine hesitancy. Through this project, I discovered that you cannot leave a community after the funding ends, you have to continue providing resources and services. Community outreach should not be a short-term relationship, researchers should strive to make sure this relationship is long-lasting.

What advice do you have for new researchers? I would encourage new researchers to find a research topic that can positively impact others. This needs to be a topic for which you would be motivated to research at 2:00 a.m. or that could potentially pull you away from one of your favorite activities. If you are willing to sacrifice your personal time for this topic, this is your research passion. After you discover this research topic, build your network of other like-minded individuals who can keep you motivated. Then, actively search for grant-funding to support your research. I would encourage faculty to spend time discovering the topics that external funders value and how their research topic can coincide with funding opportunities from these organizations. Also, make sure that everyone knows about your research interest, because they can help you discover external funding resources as well. Remember to always have your research elevator speech ready, you never know when you will need to talk about your research with a potential funder.
